Everybody deserves a fulfilling childhood but the reality is that it is challenging for many.

You could have faced trauma, caring for others, isolation, criminal exploitation, coping with a disability or learning difficulty or having your life mapped out from an early age.

And the need is increasing

Young people in greater London need more access to alternative education.

Since the pandemic in our local borough of Havering the number of young people in need of alternative education has trebled.

Here at **Lambourne End Centre**, we have seen the number of schools making regular weekly visits increase from

6 to 26

Access to a change in environment, time in nature and new ways to build resilience are critical to well-being.

NHS England is reporting a

in probable mental health problems affecting **7–16 year olds** in 2022 compared to 2017.



Alfie's story

14-year-old Alfie watched as his father was violently murdered. How could one child bear something so devastating?

Struggling with the mainstream system, Alfie dropped out of school and found his way to cope through drugs and crime.

He came to us with a cap covering his face and a hoodie over the top. He outright refused to talk to other young people and found talking to staff difficult and uncomfortable. Alfie was only willing to work with those who couldn't speak his language – the animals.

Alfie relaxed around the animals, particularly the chickens, which led to conversations with other people. Slowly, the hood and cap were replaced by a smile. At his lowest, "Lambourne End Centre was the only positive thing in his life".

Over time, Alfie's confidence grew as he found a place where he could be a teenager without external pressures. He gained recognised qualifications in Animal Care and Animal Management at Lambourne End Centre.

With us, Alfie got to do things at his own pace. He connected with others through animals and found a happier path to pursue with better aspirations.

Perfectly positioned on London's doorstep

Just 20 miles from the centre of London, Lambourne End Centre's 54-acres of natural space provides a place of belonging and a sense of purpose.


Nurturing people in nature

Patrick's story

Pat's autism meant that following school, he found it tough to find his place in the world. Instead, he spent 2 years in his bedroom playing video games, becoming more and more disconnected from the real world.

He took some persuading from his Mum to see if Lambourne End Centre might be worth trying. At first, Pat would sit in the car for an hour and go home again, too anxious to get out. Slowly, he built up to walking around the garden, then attending Food for Thought for half a day per week, being sure to leave on time. Pat started to settle in and feel part of the team.

Soon after, Pat was attending two full days a week and travelling alone on public transport. His confidence increased, and his skills developed rapidly as he felt more comfortable with us. He worried less about leaving on time and focused more on completing his task, such as staying late to water the plants on a hot day.



In four and a half years, Pat became an integral part of Lambourne End Centre and a role model to others. Pat then asked us if he could work towards a formal qualification. After two more years, he gained a Certificate in Horticulture.

Pat continued volunteering to help others whose situations were similar to his, before deciding he was ready to look for employment.

With us, Pat went from social isolation to being ready for a career. He found people who understood his needs and gave him the space to figure out who he was.

We're at the limit of what we can do

- Our residential and camping facilities are fully booked for 2024.
- Each of our learning programmes currently have lengthy waiting lists.
- Each month we turn away on average 20 groups wanting to benefit from our work.





Without significant capital investment, we have reached the limit of our facilities and are unable to meet current demand.

We believe we have the experience, the programmes and the know-how to help more young people orientate themselves, reveal their abilities and fulfil their potential to reclaim their future.


High ropes course &

New Glamping

Additional camping space will introduce more young people to camping and walking through DofE expeditions and help many of our overnight visitors feel a closer connection to nature.



Existing accommodation converted in to a dining room and additional classrooms around the courtyard.



ULEZ compliant mini buses

Replace our existing fleet with 5 ULEZ compliant mini buses which is necessary before October 2025.



Solar PV farm

Create a solar PV farm on site to provide electricity and move the Centre towards becoming carbon neutral.



Sewage treatment plant and reed bed drainage system

Replace our struggling existing sewage treatment plant and add reed bed drainage in order to cope with increased use.

Millie's story

Millie struggled with her mental health throughout her early teenage years. She selfharmed, attempted to take her own life and spent substantial periods in the hospital.

Millie first came to Lambourne End Centre with her school and instantly felt connected with the site. Almost immediately, Millie had found her safe space where she felt happy and valued. She fell in love with the goats, the horses and finally found people who understood her as they had shared similar struggles and loved the animals too.

Millie's confidence soared and she began to thrive, even volunteering with us at the weekends.

The pandemic brought pressures and worries for Millie, not helped by Lambourne End Centre having to close for several months. Without a safe space to visit or a place to belong, things proved too much.

In 2020, Millie took her own life.

With us, Millie got to breathe. She could escape her worries for a little while and enjoy being a teenager with people who understood her.



We urgently need to increase our capacity

Think about the opportunities that you've been lucky enough to experience that have made you into who you are. You could provide those opportunities to others who haven't been so lucky. Whatever their barrier is, you can knock it down for them.

will help us to strive to meet the current demand, increasing our capacity by **25%** to work with **12,500 people a year** including intensive long-term programmes for more young people like Alfie, Patrick and Millie.


